St. John Record, Feb. 16 - Considerable surprise was expressed around town this morn. at the news of the death of John TAPLEY which occurred at an early hour this morn. at his residence on Bridge Street. He had been in poor health for some time, but was not considered at all dangerously ill until yesterday. An affection of the heart was the cause of his deceased. John Tapley, as senior member of the firm Tapley Bros. of Indiantown, was perhaps one of the best respected businessmen of this city. Half a century ago he came to St. John from Maugerville (Sunbury Co.), the place of his birth, and opened up business at Indiantown as handler and surveyor of lumber. In the same place and in the same business he has continued ever since. His business has been of steady growth for he was an excellent business man, possessing natural ability, application and strict integrity. He started alone but later took into partnership the two younger brothers, Archibald TAPLEY and Capt. Daniel TAPLEY. The former is in New York under medical treatment. The other has been managing the business of the firm for the last couple of years, the deceased having been unable to give his close attention to the affairs of the establishment. Squire David TAPLEY, for a long time magistrate of Portland, is an older brother. The late Mr. Tapley has been for many years warden of St. Luke's Church and was most active and zealous in church work. He was of a charitable disposition and his many acts of kindness and beneficence are well remembered. To the temperance cause he also gave some attention and was the first president of the Temperance Reform Club of Portland which flourished years ago. A dramatic club contributed to the amusement of the north end party years back and in it he was one of the leading Theopians. So in work, religion and secular, serious and pleasant, he was an active leader. He leaves a widow and five children. Three of his sons, David K. TAPLEY, Byron TAPLEY and Ernest TAPLEY are with Alex. GIBSON at Marysville (York Co.). And it may be remarked here that Mr. Tapley and Alex. Gibson were great friends. For many years Tapley Bros. handled Mr. Gibson's lumber here and their relations were very intimate. One of the deceased's daughters, now among the departed, became Mrs. Alex. Gibson, jr. Mrs. Benj. DOWLING is a daughter of Mr. Tapley and K.C. TAPLEY is another son.

A 'Sun' reporter in quest of information called upon Robert EWING at his  
residence High St., Portland (St. John)- 'In my 19th year', said Mr. Ewing, '20th  
May 1825, I sailed from Merville for St. John in the good ship "James and Henry

Alexander GIBSON began his life without any capital, other than a sturdy constitution, a strong will, a great capacity for work and an eminently keen and practical mind. Some 30 odd years ago, Mr. Gibson removed from Lepreau River to the Nashwaak. All of those who had operated in lumbering at Lepreau before his time had made a failure of the enterprise, but Mr. Gibson won success and retired from that river with a large amount of money. Prior to his coming to Nashwaak, the property there was owned by Robert Rankine & Co. They sold the mill and property around the present Marysville, including 7,000 acres of timbered land to Mr. Gibson. On taking possession of the river, Mr. Gibson saw at once the very first requisite, the lack of which has caused the former operators to lose money and had greatly depreciated the value of the property. This was a first class boom held by a mile or two of piers. The Rankin firm had been driving logs all summer having no place to hold them; consequently their river driving, instead of costing them 50 cents per thousand, really cost \$1.50 or more, and the logs frequently remained in the stream throughout the season, the firm being unable to get them down to the mill. Mr. Gibson, by building dams and improving the streams increased the river driving facilities of the Nashwaak so much that no drive has ever yet been 'hung up' on the stream since he took possession. On coming to the Nashwaak he had the lands carefully explored and surveyed. Some of these he purchased at public auction and others he bought for the New Brunswick & Nova Scotia Land Co., thus acquiring all the most valuable lands, nearly 170,000 acres on the river. Edward JACK of Fredericton, civil engineer, died Tuesday eve. last week after a severe illness of about ten days. Mr. Jack was born in St. Andrews (Charlotte Co.) about 70 years ago and has been a resident of Fredericton for a great many years. In early life he studied law and was called to the bar in 1850. In a short time he abandoned the law for civil engineering. For many years Mr. Jack had charge of the stumpage dept. of the Crown Lands office but resigned 15 years ago. He has since been engaged in prospecting and looking after the timber lands for lumber operators. No man in New Brunswick knew more about the physical geography and natural resources than did Mr. Jack. He was an elder in St. Paul's Presbyterian Church, Fredericton. R. Melvin JACK of St. Andrews, is the only surviving brother. Mrs. J.T. NEVILLE of St. John's, Nfld. and Mrs. W.B. MORRIS of St. Andrews, are his sisters. The funeral took place in St. John last Thursday. The provincial administration recognized his worth and appointed him deputy surveyor of the rich timber lands of Charlotte Co. About 1862 he came to Fredericton, having been delegated to select lumber berths for Alexander GIBSON, a contract which engaged his attention for several years. He has lived here ever since. When the stumpage system was first introduced, Hon. B.R. STEVENSON was surveyor general and he appointed Mr. Jack stumpage agent with headquarters at the Crown Land office. This position he held until 1881 when he voluntarily resigned to make room for his half-brother, Melvin Jack. From then till now he has been active in lumbering and other projects on his own or others behalf. He could write and read French and German with as much accuracy and fluency as he could the English language. In 1884, the N.B. government appointed him commissioner of their exhibits at the International Forestry Exhibition held at Edinburgh. Mr. Jack explored large tracts on the Miramichi for William RICHARDS and about seven years ago, in company with Ora GILPATRICK, the late Frank GILMAN and he purchased from the N.B. & N.S. Land Co. 45,000 acres of hardwood land situated near Keswick, which is now being operated extensively to supply the material for fast blocks. A few years ago, however, he sold out his interest to Messrs. T.G. LOGGIE and E.B. WINSLOW. He has not been connected with an heavy timber transaction since, but he has made arrangements with Messrs. Harris of the Moncton Sugar Refinery to explore poplar births on the Miramichi, a wood now being largely used for the manufacture of barrels. He has been among the promoters of the Grand Falls water power and boom company.

Yarmouth, N.S., July 4 - The saddest disaster that has happened on our shores for a number of years occurred Sunday eve. and was accompanied by a terrible loss of life, no less than seventeen persons finding a watery grave thereby. The supposed scene of the terrible shipwreck is Gannet Ledge, a dangerous ledge that runs out from Gannet rock, which is situated about four miles from Chebogue Point and ten miles from Yarmouth, over which the turf breaks with almost unabating fury and which in stormy weather is a most dangerous place. The British ship "Peter Stuart", Capt. HUGHES, left St. John Wednesday afternoon and since that time had made but little headway, experiencing nothing but head winds and dense fog. On Sunday, the captain thinking he was clear of all headlands gave the order to put on all sail. They were sailing along at the rate of 12 miles an hour when suddenly they heard the surf and struck with terrible force on the ledge, knocking a hole in the vessel's bottom. The waves rolled with terrific force on the unfortunate bark, completely sweeping her decks and in less than half an hour she began to go to pieces. The only hope of safety lay in an endeavor to escape, which they undertook on boats and rafts. The captain's wife and boy were put into the boat which capsized, and they were swept away in the darkness and never again seen. The same experience happened again and again, each time resulting in the death of some poor sailor. The raft on the way to the shore began to break up and when the boats got to its rescue but three were left on it. As they came within a short distance of the shore again the boat upset and the others went down to a watery grave. As they gathered on the shore bruised and completely undone, they found that the captain's wife and child and fourteen sailors had been drowned. Eleven had arrived safely on land. All the men are being cared for most kindly by the people at Chebogue Point. Those drowned are all foreigners, as is also the captain, who is considerably bruised and broken down by the severe loss that has overtaken him. The "Stuart" was bound from St. John to London with a load of deals. She was an iron vessel of 1,447 tons register, built in 1868 at Dumbarton, Scotland and was owned by Stevens of Liverpool. Her cargo consisted of 1,111,196 feet of deals, 69,552 feet deal ends and 89,490 feet scantling etc., shipped by Alexander GIBSON.
